30th anniversary of Cusack and Beattie shootings

The deaths that changed everything

THIS WEEKEND marks the 30th anniversary of two deaths in Derry which resulted in a complete change in the political landscape of the north and marked the beginning of the demise of the Stormont government.

On July 8 1971 the British army shot dead two Derry men, Seamus Cusack and Dessie Beattie in separate incidents and ensured that the Catholic population of the city became completely alienated from the Northern state.

The two deaths had massive repercussions at the time although with the introduction of internment and all the ensuing deaths the families of the men never received any acknowledgement that their sons were innocent.

Seamus Cusack was shot by the British army in the early hours of July 8. Eyewitnesses were adamant that although there had been rioting in the area earlier, at the time of the shooting things had quietened down.

Mr. Cusack was standing with two other men when he was shot in the thigh. He was taken to Letterkenny Hospital but died shortly afterwards.

When news of his death spread Derry saw some of the most serious rioting since the British army had arrived.

It was during the course of that rioting on the afternoon of July 8 that Dessie Beattie was shot dead.

As was the case in many subsequent shootings the British army claimed that Mr. Beattie was about to throw a nail bomb when he was shot.

This was disputed by eyewitnesses who said that the dead had nothing in his hand when soldiers shot him close to the Bogside Inn.

Inquest

Later at an inquest into his death a forensic expert said there was no evidence of anything on the dead man's hands to suggest he was handling a nail bomb when he was shot.

Also at the inquest an entry in the British army log book seemed to show a major discrepancy in the official version.

Two soldiers identified as Mr. A and Mr. B gave evidence of firing a shot at a man about to light an object they

took to be a nail bomb. The evidence of both soldiers was almost identical and counsel for the family questioned them on this point.

But later an officer gave evidence from the log book in which an entry claimed that a shot had been fired at a man who had fired at soldiers. The inquest returned an open verdict on both dead men.

At a subsequent trial in Belfast the Judge accepted that the allegation that Seamus Cusack was carrying a rifle when he was shot was untrue.

Seamus Cusack's sister, Mrs. Kathleen Bradley, said that despite this one in authority had ever publicly admitted her

brother was innocent.

She said: "Seamus' death devastated our family. He was the fifth oldest in a family of 11 and the whole family was just devastated when he was shot."

"To make it worse, they lied about him claiming he had a rifle in his hands when he was shot, which everyone knew was rubbish."

She added: "At the time of his death there was a massive show of support and sympathy from the Derry community which went some way towards helping my mother cope with her loss."

"She was a kind and generous woman herself but she could never get over how people reacted to Seamus' death."

Mrs. Bradley added: "In

some ways it is hard at times not to be bitter about what happened to my brother. The British Army killed him and then lied about him, but then with everything that happened afterwards his death was almost forgotten about."

She said: "I don't think it is too much to ask that after 30 years the British Government could admit they killed my brother, a completely innocent man."

Thirty years later the Beattie family still want justice for their brother. Raymond Beattie, a brother of the dead man said: "Dessie was the second youngest in our family of ten."

"His death had a massive impact upon our whole family and my

father died four years later of a massive heart attack brought on by the stress of Dessie's death."

He continued: "I remember when they brought his remains back to the house I made a vow that I would do something about his death."

"But, for years my mother could not bring herself to talk about Dessie's death so we as a family did not feel that we could raise the issue. My mother is dead now and so we want justice for Dessie."

Mr. Beattie continued: "We are not saying that there should be all sorts of inquiries or even that some soldier should be locked up but we do want some official

acknowledgement that our brother was innocent."

"I remember my father was offered some paltry sum in compensation but he refused to take it on the grounds that it was blood money."

Following the shootings of Cusack and Beattie the newly formed SDLP told the then Unionist Prime Minister Brian Faulkner, that they would withdraw from Stormont if an official inquiry was not held into the deaths.

When this was refused they withdrew and effectively began the process that would see the eventual suspension of Stormont.

Inquiry

An unofficial inquiry into the two deaths was held in the Guildhall chaired by Lord Gifford and it found that both men were innocent.

Throughout the city the deaths also marked the end of any hope of a peaceful relationship between the local population and the British army. The introduction of internment a month later resulted in the virtual secession of the Bogside, Brandywell and Creggan communities from the Northern state.

Martin McGuinness has said that the deaths marked a pivotal point in the city's relations with the Northern state and compared them to the Battle of the Bogside.

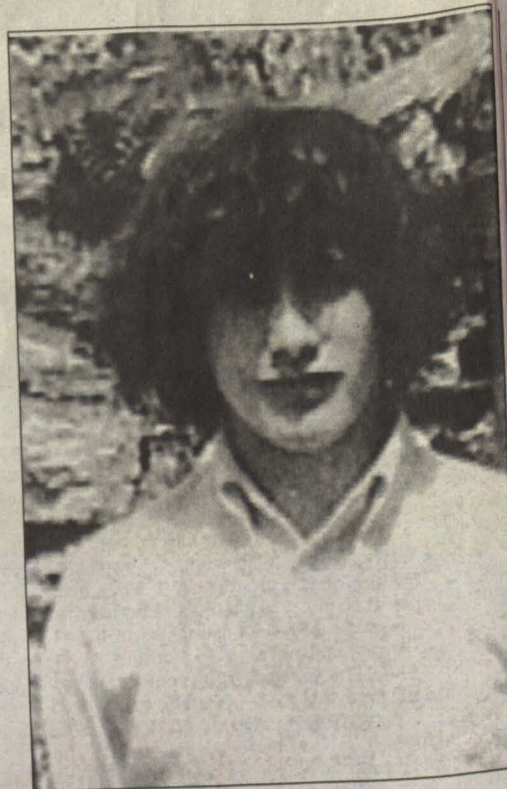
Mr. Beattie said that the funeral of his brother was one of the largest he had ever seen.

But he added despite the huge turnout and the massive political repercussions of the death at the end of the day the family still had to cope with their loss.

He said: "I cannot say that all the political fuss of the deaths made much difference to my family."

"After the funerals we were still on our own and trying to deal with the death of a brother and a son."

There will be a memorial Mass held for Dessie Beattie this Sunday night in Termonbaca at 7.30 p.m. and everyone is welcome.

Printers threaten strike

'Journal' rejects pay allegations

Printers at Derry Journal Newspapers have served notice on the company of their intention to strike later this month. The printers, based at the company's plant at Pennyburn, claim their wages are lagging between £3,000-£4,000 behind printers in Belfast who do similar work. But last night Derry Journal editor, Pat McArd, rejecting the claims, hit back at the strike threat. Mr. McArd pointed out that the basic salaries of existing Derry printers increased by an average of 61 per cent in the year 2000.

Mr. McArd said: "We are very disappointed that the Graphical Paper Media Union (GPMU) have decided on this course of action and we would appeal to them to think again. We would doubt if there is any group of workers

in Derry which has got a pay rise of 61 per cent, particularly in view of the desperate current economic climate in this part of the world. Indeed, against a background of £2m. investment at the 'Journalprint' plant in the last two years the union can hardly claim we haven't been looking after the long term interests of the printers. We hope commonsense will prevail."

Earlier this week on local radio, Andy Snoddy, Branch Secretary of the GPMU, commented: "Our members are incensed that despite massive increases in productivity, they are still amongst the lowest paid in the Trinity Mirror Group."

Rejecting this claim Mr. McArd said the union representative was, conveniently, ignoring a

number of key factors: "It is a matter of record, as Andy Snoddy well knows, that the average length of service in Belfast is eleven years whereas in Derry it is three years. In fact, most of our printers have less than two years experience in newspaper printing. It is the old tradition, rightly or wrongly, that the longer you are with a company the higher your salary is."

The Journal editor also rejected the claim that Derry printers are earning £3/400 less than their Belfast counterparts.

"This is simply not true," said Mr. McArd, who added: "Derry lags behind Belfast by about 5 per cent and if our staff had the same length of service there is little doubt they would be on very similar wages. The

suggestion of some sort of discrimination between Derry and Belfast is totally inaccurate and unfair."

Amicable solution

Mr. McArd concluded: "The growth of the print site in Derry has been rapid and initial problems quickly overcome. We are now printing the 'Mirror' and the 'Sunday Mirror' plus a whole host of other titles at Pennyburn, all to a high standard. The company's faith in our printers is well founded and we hope that we can sort out our problems in an amicable and reasonable way. We would suggest, in the strongest possible terms, this is not the way to go about solving any difficulties that exists."
