Minutes. The Minutes of the last meeting were read, confirmed and signed.

Finance. The Secretary reported that the Bank overdraft was £1661-5-10.

Letter from Messrs. Craig Gardner & Co. enclosing copies of the Statement of Accounts for the quarter ending 30th Nov. 1935 and suggesting that if the outstanding debt of £30 due by Mr. Gorman Forbes was not paid before the 29th February it might be well to write it off.

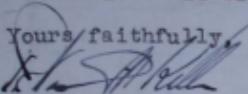

Cox & Co.

A letter was read from Messrs Arthur Cox & Co. setting out the procedure to be adopted in connection with the business of allocating shares to Senator Blythe, Mr Higgins and Mr O'Donovan since Mr O'Farrell. Messrs Cox's letter also contained suggestions for the amendment of the Articles of Association but the Board decided that consideration of these suggestions be postponed until the allocation of the shares had been completed.

Allotment of Shares to  
Sen. Blythe, Mr Higgins  
and Mr O'Donovan took no part, declaring that they were personally interested.

Mr Higgins The Directors had under consideration the desirability of allotting shares to Senator Blythe, Mr Higgins and Mr O'Donovan, in consideration of their past services and of the future services that they would render to the Company; and it having been ascertained that

Mr Yeats, Mr Astorson and Dr. Starkie had no objection to such allotments being made, the following resolution proposed by Dr. Richard Hayes and seconded by Mr Lennox Astorson was passed :-

"That the Seal of the Company be affixed to the Agreement already prepared between the Company and Senator Blythe, Mr Higgins and Mr O'Donovan respectively providing for the allotment to each of these three Gentlemen in consideration of past and future services of one hundred fully paid Ordinary Shares in the Capital of the Company, and applications for such allotments having been received from each of them, it is hereby resolved that one hundred fully paid shares in the Capital of the Company Numbers 391 to 490 inclusive, be and the same are hereby allotted to Senator Ernest Blythe in pursuance of the terms of the said agreement; and that one hundred fully paid shares in the Capital of the Company Numbers 491 to 590 inclusive, be and the same are hereby allotted to Frederic Robert Higgins in pursuance of the terms of the said agreement; and that one hundred fully paid shares in the Capital of the Company Numbers 591 to 690 inclusive, be and the same are hereby allotted to Michael O'Donovan in pursuance of the terms of the said agreement."

Mr Hunt's report.

Mrs Hunt reported that Mr T. Stephenson had broken his arm on Tuesday night and that as business with "Coriolanus" had however bad for the two nights the play was taken off and "Paul Twyning" substituted. Mr Hunt expected that Mr Tornman might be paid half-salary for the week and the Board agreed.

Mrs Hunt also reported that Mrs Govee objected to the salary paid her for playing for nights - the week claiming that she should be

paid full salary as had been the custom. The salary she had received was £6-5-0 made up of 2 nights at £3-15-0 per week and 4 nights at £7-10-0 per week, and the Board decided that this was correct.

Mr Hunt said that Miss MacKay from the School of Art who was assisting Miss Moisescwitsch was <sup>Specially</sup> interested in costume and scene designing and scene painting and he suggested that if it were possible it would be advisable to procure another student who was interested in this work and who might eventually take Miss Moisescwitsch's place as a permanent designer and painter.

The Board suggested that Mr Hunt get into touch with Mr George Atkinson with a view to obtaining a suitable person.

It was decided after some discussion that the bills to follow the Macnamara should be :- Feb 10th Mountain Dew or Insurance Money

Feb 14th The Play & the Stars

Feb 28th Boyd's Shop (St. I. Ernie)

Theatre Free List. Mr O'Connor raised the question of the free list and complained that passes issued to exhibitors of Box Office Goods did not appear to reach the people entitled to them. After some discussion it was decided that the list of people receiving free seats should be circulated among the Directors and that in future application from others who might consider themselves entitled to free seats must be made in writing with a stamped addressed envelope for a reply.

Advertiser's next Players. It was decided that as the losses during the last quarter have been heavy and the financial position of the Theatre was not good, it would be well if the contract players were made aware of the position, so that a frank discussion could take place and any complaints

which the players might have could be heard. Secretaries and Mr. Higgins were despatched to meet the Contract Players on Wednesday 29th January at 1pm.

In improving finances Mr. Higgins referred to the suggested meeting of the Directors on Monday, 27th January, to enquire into the <sup>all</sup> items of expenditure and the discussion of future productions. He Secretary had reported that as he was playing in Paul Tigray's he could not attend at the hours fixed 8pm, and Mr. Higgins considered that the discussion of future plays that had to take place during the present meeting, made the special meeting on Monday unnecessary. He said that whatever economies could be made would be very small and that the main consideration should be plays that would bring in a good return. Mr. Higgins considered that three popular plays of a profit making type should be put on with the fourth week devoted to a new play. In this way it would be possible to produce one new play a month which might or might not be financially successful, without incurring any loss to the Theatre.

Present Senator E. Blythe in the Chair, Mr. T. D. Higgins.  
Minutes. The Minutes of the last meeting were read, confirmed and signed.

Finance. The Secretary reported that the Bank Overdraft was £ 1721-13-10.  
Arising out of the question of finance Mr. Higgins enquired if it would be advisable to approach the Government with a view to getting an increase in the subsidy. Senator Blythe was of the opinion that the matter might be discussed by the Board when Dr. Hayes was present as he would be the Director most suitable to sound the Government or the Minister of Finance on the subject.

Larachet  
Presentation Fund A letter was read from Mr. George Shields enclosing £1-100 which he wished should be accepted as a contribution from him to the Larachet Presentation Fund.

Mr. Higgins stated he had learned that Mr. Larachet had arranged with Mr. Sean O'Sullivan for the payment by him (Mr. Larachet) to Mr. O'Sullivan of the difference between the £60 payable by the Theatre and the charge made for the portrait. It was Mr. Larachet's intention to write to the Directors stating that the difference was being made up by a private subscription.

Dr. St. J. Ervine. The Board accepted the amendments made by Dr. St. John Ervine for the Contract for his play "Boyd's Shop".

Meeting of the Committee. Senator Blythe reported that Mr. Higgins and himself had met the Contract Players on the 29th Jan'y and had explained to them the financial position and the policy of the Board regarding

productions. The meeting had been very amicable and at its conclusion the Playgoers had thanked the Directors for having met them in this way. The Board were of the opinion that this meeting had been very useful and that it would materially help in the smooth running of the Theatre.

Mr Hunt. Mr Hunt reported he had received a letter from Miss Seelye complaining about the postponement of her new play. Mr Hunt explained that for financial reasons it was considered advisable to put on the new Ervine play as soon as possible and that he would write to Miss Seelye explaining the position to her.

Mr Hunt also reported that there was no script of "Insurance Money" in the Theatre and no record of what had become of it. As the author, Geo. Shields had not a script either, the play could not be done at present and it was proposed to put on "Mountain Dew" instead. Mr Hunt then mentioned a play "The Pedagogic" by G. Meredith which had been submitted for consideration. He said it was a very experimental play and he would not suggest that it be put on for a week but he did suggest that it might be possible to rehearse it in the evenings and give it a special performance on a Sunday night in order to try it out. The Directors decided that they would read it without delay.

Senator E. Blythe in the Chair, Mr. Leopold Robinson, Dr. Richard Hayes, Mr. F. R. Higgins.

Minutes.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read, confirmed and signed.

Finance.

The Secretary reported that the Bank Overdraft was £1647-10-0.

P.M. Selby's

A letter was read from P.M. Selby offering the following terms:-

Belfast & Cork.

Belfast 45% up to £700 Pross : 50% if over £700

Cork 55% up to £600 Pross : 60% if over £600

The Board reluctantly decided to accept these terms for the vicinity of the Company to these areas.

Mrs McSwiggan.

A letter was read from Mrs McSwiggan enquiring if it was permissible for an author to know the personnel of the Reading Committee before sending a play to the Theatre for consideration. The Board decided that it was not permissible.

James T. O'Farrell

A letter was read from James T. O'Farrell & Co., Solicitors enquiring if the Directors had any objection to raise to the granting of Letters Patent to the Lessees of the Torch Theatre, Capel Street, Dublin. The Board decided that they had no objection.

Sean O'Sullivan

A letter was read from Mr. Sean O'Sullivan stating he was proceeding to launch a portrait with the portrait of Dr. Larchet, size 46" x 36". The price of the portrait would be £80, of which the Abbey Theatre would contribute £60, the balance being provided by private subscription. The Board decided that no action need be taken in the matter.

Con & Co

A letter was read from Messrs Con & Co. Whistlers pertaining a copy of a letter written by Messrs Hayes & Sons, Solicitors stating that Messrs Whistlers

re Whistlers

were not prepared to accept less than £8,000 for their premises in Marlborough St. and that they would be willing to allow £4,000 to remain outstanding on a first mortgage of the property at 5%.

The Secretary reported that at Mr Cox's request he had interviewed Mr Cox regarding this matter. Mr Cox had pointed out that if the £8,000 were borrowed from the Bank at 5% the yearly cost of the premises including rates, repairs, insurance and ground rent would be about £565. Against this sum there would be a saving of £100 rent at present paid to Whytes for the basement and whatever sum would be saved by having additional space that would allow work to be done in Theatre which is at present cut out, scene building etc. Mr Cox considered that borrowing the £8,000 from the Bank would place the Theatre entirely at the mercy of the Bank and that the position was very difficult as it would be very unwise to allow the property to be acquired by an outside party.

The Directors considered the matter and decided that Messrs Whyte be asked to give permission for an inspection of the premises on Friday 21<sup>st</sup> February at 4.30 pm and that Mr M. Scott be asked to join the Directors in their inspection.

Mr Robinson said he was aware that the Royal Hibernian Academy were definitely endeavouring to get premises and that it might be possible for the Theatre and the Academy to co-operate regarding Whytes. He said he would see Mr Deane and enquire from him.

The Board decided that the matter be left unsolved until Friday, 21<sup>st</sup>

M. Hunt reported he had had a further letter from Miss Accoy asking if the date of the production of her new play could be changed, as the date fixed would not be suitable to her. M. Hunt said to alter the date would upset the present scheme of productions and the Board agreed with this view.

M. Hunt also reported that Mr. Cyril Cusack had been offered a part in a film in London. If Mr. Cusack accepted the offer the Theatre would have no actor to play Young man parts, and M. Hunt enquired if the Board would think it worth while to offer Mr. Cusack a short contract at a small salary. After some discussion it was decided not to offer a contract.

M. Hunt pointed out that the problem of finding actors and actresses for the Theatre was a very serious one. The School of Acting did not appear to have any people who would be useful and it seemed that no benefit would accrue to the Theatre from the School as at present run.

After some discussion it was decided that Miss Mooney be asked to come to the next Board meeting so that the matter could be gone into fully with her.

The Board directed that Mr. M. Scott be asked what his views were regarding the painting of the new plaster work on the balcony.

16th Feby 1936. Minutes of a meeting of the Board of Directors of the National Theatre Society, Ltd. held at the Abbey Theatre, Dublin, on Friday, 14th February, 1936, at 5.30 p.m.

Present

Seán E. Ó Siadhail in the Chair, Dr Richard Hayes, Mr F. R. Higgins, Mr Frank O'Connor.

Minutes.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read, confirmed and signed.

Finance.

The Secretary reported that the Bank Overdraft was £ 2025 = 3 = 10. He stated that on the 27th September 1934 the Board had passed a resolution sanctioning the application for an overdraft to the extent of £ 2,200 / 10. As the overdraft was now approaching this figure, the Manager of the O'Connell St. Branch of the Ulster & Leinster Bank was applying to his Directors for a renewal of the overdraft of this amount and was also informing them that an application for a large sum might be received at a later date.

The Secretary informed the Board that the Government Subsidy of £ 1,000 would be payable in March and would probably be received about the middle of that month.

Issue of Share

The following resolution was proposed by Dr Richard Hayes, seconded by Mr Frank O'Connor and passed:-

"That in accordance with the resolution passed at a meeting of the Board held on the 20th January 1936, the Seal of the Company be affixed to the following Share Certificates:-  
Numbers 15. One hundred Shares of £ 1 each numbered 391

to 490 inclusive, to Senator Ernest Blythe.

Number 16. One hundred shares of £1 each, numbered 491 to 590 inclusive, to Frederick Street Higgins.

Number 17. One hundred shares of £1 each, numbered 591 to 690 inclusive; to Michael O'Donovan."

This resolution was passed after the Share Certificates had been submitted, examined and passed. They were then sealed, signed and agreed to be issued.

To from Mr. Shields. A letter was read from Mr. Arthur Shields stating he had recovered from his run-down condition and that he was ready at any time to resume his position as Assistant Producer. The Board decided that no change be made at present and that the matter be considered at a late date.

Mrs Deeny. A letter was read from Mrs Teresa Deeny complaining that owing to the further postponement of the production of the play "Katie Roche," the play would now be produced during Lent, the worst part of the year. Mrs Deeny asked for a promise that the play would be revived before the end of the summer. The Board decided Mrs Deeny should be informed that the play would be revived at a late date and that it was also proposed to revive the play "Temporal Powers".

To Mr Scott: Letter. A letter was read from Mr. Fochl Scott, Architect, offering two suggestions for the decoration of the new plaster work on the Balcony (1) painting it a cream color to match the walls of the auditorium (2) inviting Students of the School of Art to compete by submitting designs for treating the Balcony with murals of a suitable nature.

Mr Scott also stated he was still endeavouring to reach an agreement with the Corporation authorities as to a satisfactory

method of providing safe dressing-room accommodation in case of fire and also a safe exit from the dressing rooms.

The Board decided that with reference to the Balcony, Mr Hunt should consult Mr Athlone regarding the proposed competition by School of Art Students, and that with reference to the dressing rooms and safe exit, further news from Mr Scott should be awaited.

Miss Grove's appeal against the casting cast in "The Plough and the Stars" was considered. The Board considered the appeal made by Miss Grove against her being taken out of the part of Nora Clitheroe in "The Plough and the Stars". The Chairman said he was against interviewing the Players regarding the casting of plays as it would create difficulties if it were decided to re-cast old plays. On the basis of the information at their disposal the Board had selected Miss Richards for the part of Nora Clitheroe, as she was considered better than Miss Grove.

Mr Higgins said it appeared that Miss Richards used the Theatre when it suited her and that under circumstances such as that it was unfair to the established Player that work should be given to others. It also appeared that Miss Richards was anxious to play the part owing to the fact that a casting Director of a Film Company was likely to see the play during the week, and that she had canvassed with this in view.

After some discussion it was decided on the motion of Mr Connor seconded by Mr Higgins that Miss Grove be restored to the part.

Miss Grove was then interviewed and was informed by the Chairman that she was to play Nora Clitheroe, that Miss Richards had been selected for the part as she was considered

better suited to it, but that as Miss Nichols had canvassed for the part it could not be given to her, as the Board could not operate if canvassing by the players were allowed.

The Board reserved the right, as a matter of principle, to change the cast of any play and any judgment they might give, would only be given in the best interests of the Theatre.

Mr Grove thanked the Board and with drew.

It was decided that in future any complaints from the players to the Board should be in writing.

Mr H. Morley having been called before the Board, Mr Hunt submitted the outline of a scheme for the re-organisation of the School of Acting. He pointed out that the function of the School was to supply new talent to the Theatre, that there was a necessity for closer relationship between the School and the Theatre and that under the present system many of the pupils being trained would be of no use to the Theatre. Mr Hunt went on to explain his proposed scheme of training under the headings Theory of Acting, Practice of Acting and Special class for Teenage leads. After some discussion it was decided on the proposal of Mr O'Connor seconded by Mr Higgins that the general principle of the scheme be adopted. It was also decided that the scheme could not be put into operation until after the end of the present session of the school and that in the meantime Mr Hunt should consult Miss Sara Payne as to the possibility of her giving the pupils lessons in Rhythmnical movement as part of the new scheme. Mr Hunt suggested "The End of the Beginning" a one act play by Sean O'Casey for production. Decision on this was postponed until the

next meeting of the Board.

The Far-Off Islands was selected for 2<sup>nd</sup> March, the bill for the week commencing 9th March to be decided at the next meeting, and Katie Roche to be produced on 16th March.

Play Competition. Owing to the absence of Dr Starkie the plays sent to him had not been read and it was decided that these should be divided among the Directors available in Dublin.

Minutes. The Minutes of the last meeting were read, confirmed and signed.

Finance. The Secretary reported that the Bank Overdraft was £ 1969-5-6.

Ir from Cormelike Fathers. In reply to a letter from the Cormelike Fathers the Board decided there was no objection to amateur performances of "Professor Tim" to be given in the hall attached to the Church in Whitefriars Street, Dublin.

Ir from Muriel Kelly. In reply to a letter from Miss Muriel Kelly, Abbey School of Ballet the Board decided that she should arrange with Mr Hunt for a Saturday afternoon in April for the performance by her pupils in the Theatre as on some Saturdays the Theatre would not be free owing to dress rehearsals.

Ir from Tom Devy. A letter was read from Tom Devy thanking the Directors for informing him that his play "Aetic Roche" will be revived and also that it was proposed to revive "Temporal Powers".

Ir from Mrs Shakes Richards. A letter was read from Mrs Richards complaining about her being taken off the cast of "The Blaugh & the Star". It was decided that the letter be acknowledged and Mrs Richards informed that it had been laid before the Directors.

Ir from Mrs Grace Plunkett. A letter was read from Mrs Grace Plunkett declining to do drawings for the Playboy as she had done similar work for the Gate Theatre and had not been paid for it altho' the drawing had been published in one of the daily papers.

Letter from Miss  
Ria Mooney. A letter was read from Miss Ria Mooney complaining that she was getting very few parts in the Theatre and that her remuneration from the School of Acting was not sufficient to justify her in continuing her work there, and suggesting that the Directors might consider some one else for the next session. Miss Mooney also complained that she had not been cast for the part of Rosie Redmond in the current production of "The Playgirl & the Star" altho she had been in the original cast.

Mr Hunt said he had cast Miss Mooney whenever possible and after some discussion it was decided that he should suggest to Mr Dolan that Miss Mooney should be employed when possible.

Whytes  
Premises. Mr H. Scott, Architect, was interviewed by the Board and said he had examined Whytes premises. The building was perfectly sound, walls and roof in good condition. The floors could be taken out without any difficulty. He suggested that the frontage on May St and portion of the Marlborough St frontage could be converted into shops. He considered that £2000 the price asked by Whytes was a fair price and that the value of the site would increase.

It was decided that Mr Scott should see the Directors again on Friday, 28th Feby. and that he should submit a sketch of his proposals re shops. It was also decided that Messrs Cox be asked to endeavour to get Messrs Whytes to reduce their price. It was decided that "The End of the Beginning" a one act play by Sean O'Casey be produced at some late date. The following bills were arranged in

The Board considered the question of producing "The Phoenix and the Cockatoos" by Derryan Walls. Mr Hunt reported that he had met Mr Wall who was not very anxious that this play should be produced.

The Chairman said that both Mr Yeats and <sup>he</sup> himself had liked the play and that if it was decided not to produce it the author should be encouraged and asked to try another play. It was agreed that the play be not produced and that Mr Hunt should see the author, and encourage him to write another play and submit it.

Play Competition It was decided that Mr Rutherford Rayne and Mr Sean O Faolain be invited to act as final adjudicators in the Play Competition, the proposal being that three plays be submitted to them for final consideration.

Articles of Association. It was decided that the amendments to the Articles of Association suggested by Mr Arthur Cox should be circulated among the Directors with a view to further consideration at the next meeting.

M. Hunt's report.

Mr Hunt reported that with reference to the decoration of the Balcony, Mr Atkinson was not in favour of a Students' competition for mural designs. He considered that such a competition would not be good for the students.

He suggested that Miss McKay be invited to submit designs. Mr. Hunt said he had asked Miss McKay to submit two designs which were not to cost more than £20 each to carry out.

Mr. Hunt also reported that as Miss Nichols could not play in "Boyd's Shop" he had given the part to Miss Fulham.

He enquired as to the possibility of producing a verse play in the Peacock doing it as cheaply as possible and using as many evening people as were available. The Board approved of the idea and suggested that as an alternative an experimental play might be produced in the Abbey on a Sunday night. The matter would be considered further at the next meeting.

Mr. Hunt submitted the cast of "Tobie Roche" which was passed as amended by the Board.

The Board decided that the Players be paid for Ash Wednesday, the Theatre being closed on that night.

After some discussion it was proposed by Mr Frank O'Connor seconded by Mr F. D. Higgins "that the Board advise to their decision not to let the Abbey Theatre for Sunday performances". This was passed, Mr Robinson dissenting.

Mrs Empress Ltd.

A letter was read from Mrs Empress Ltd. London enquiring if the Directors would consider a tour in Scotland or in England, and enquiring what plays would be likely to be done. It was decided that the Hunt should obtain further information from the writers with details as to terms etc.

R.C.O. Film  
Corporation.

A letter was read from the London Agent of the R.C.O. Film Corporation stating she was coming to Dublin and was anxious to discuss with the Managers of the Theatre the possibility of obtaining the services of Miss Ellen Corcoran, M. Barry Fitzgerald, Mr J. F. McCormick & Mr Arthur Shields for a film production of "The Plough & the Stars" to be made in Hollywood.

Mr Hunt reported that he had interviewed Miss Reissa, the Agent, and that the main proposals were:- That the production of the film

Should commence on the 1<sup>st</sup> July next and that it would take about six weeks - the players would in consequence be away from Dublin about ten weeks. Mr Hunt had suggested that the date of commencement should be put back to 1<sup>st</sup> June and that the players should be back in Dublin by 20<sup>th</sup> July. The salaries he suggested were Mr Barry Fitzgerald 850 £lrs. Mr McCormick & Mr Gove at a joint salary of 900 £lrs., Mr Shields 500 £lrs., all per week and all protracted six weeks with return passages paid. The Elm Corporation were anxious to get these players chiefly as a means of using the name of the Abbey Theatre in their publicity, and a sum of 750 £lrs was mentioned as payment for the use of the Theatre's name and as compensation for the loss to the Theatre owing to the absence of these players for a considerable period.

The Board discussed these terms and Mr O'Connor protested against the figure of 750 £lrs. for using the Abbey Theatre's name. He stated that the Corporation should be asked for 500 £lrs.

On the proposal of Mr O'Connor seconded by Mr Higgins it was decided that Mr Hunt be instructed to conclude the negotiations and to reach an agreement with the Corporation and that if the date of commencement of the production was not put back to 1<sup>st</sup> June, then a sum of £1000 should be asked instead of £150 for the use of the Theatre's name.

Mr O'Connor dissented from this decision maintaining that £500 should be demanded in any event.

Mr Hunt then interviewed the players interested and reported

to the Board that these players were agreeable that ten per cent  
of the salaries paid to them by the Corporation should go  
to the Theatre as compensation for the loss of their  
services.

Whyte's  
Premises. The Board interviewed Mr H. Scott, Architect who submitted  
plans for the erection of three shops on portion of Whyte's  
premises. He estimated the cost of erecting these shops  
at £2,500 and considered that a very conservative estimate  
of the rent obtainable would be £3-10-0 each per week.

The area utilised in this way would not interfere with  
the provision of a proper scene dock nor would it interfere  
with any future scheme for improving the Theatre.

The Directors discussed the matter very fully with  
Mr Scott and decided to consider the matter further at  
a later date.

The Articles of  
Association. Amendments to the Articles of Association as suggested by  
Mr Arthur Cox had been circulated among the Directors  
and it was decided that Mr Cox should prepare  
drafts of the suggested new Articles in which the  
Board might consider them.

No Heat Layet. Mr Hunt submitted the casts of "Fa-Off Hills" and  
"Autumn Fire" which were approved. He also submitted  
an estimate of the cost of the production of "Katie Roche"  
which would be about £80-10-0 including Cast, scenery  
and props.

Mr Hunt raised the question of "On The Locks" by Shaw and the  
Board decided that the play should go on.

Mr Hunt then referred to a complaint which had been made  
thru by Mr Wilson who considered the present cost of  
production was too high. Mr Hunt said it would be  
unfair for him to continue production if the Board  
were of Mr Wilson's opinion.

Mr Robertson said that as the financial year of the Theatre  
ended on 29th Feby. the Auditors Report for the year  
would be available in a few weeks and he thought  
that discussion of the matter raised by Mr Hunt  
should be postponed until the Report had been  
received.

The Board decided that Mr Hunt should proceed with  
his productions as arranged as the Directors were  
of opinion that the productions were very good  
and should not be interfered with.

Sunday broad-  
casts from R.N.

The Secretary reported that Mr John McDonagh of the  
short  
Broadcasting Station was anxious to have comedies  
broadcasted from the Studio by the Abbey Company  
on Sunday nights. The payment would be £10 per  
half hour and he was anxious to have the principal  
Abbey Players. The dates suggested were April 19 & 26, May  
3rd and 10th.

The Directors were not anxious to accept this  
proposal as no profit was likely to accrue to the  
Theatre, and they decided that if the Players wished to  
make arrangements for these broadcasts they were at  
liberty to do so.

The Board decided that they would see a rehearsal  
of the School of Acting on Friday 6th March at 6 p.m.

Present Senator E. Blythe in the Chair, Dr. Richard Hayes, Mr. F. P. Higgins, Mr. Frank O'Connor.

Minutes. The Minutes of the last meeting were read, confirmed and signed.

Finance. Mr. Hunt reported that the Bank Draft was £ 1974 = 12 = 9.  
As Mr. Hunt had obtained leave of absence his written report was read by the Secretary.

R.K.O. Mr. Hunt reported that he had interviewed Miss Reissa of the R.K.O. Corporation that he had asked £ 1000 for the use of the name of the Theatre and that Miss Reissa on behalf of the Corporation refused to consider the figure. Eventually the figure of £ 200 was agreed upon subject to confirmation by R.K.O. this figure to stand at whatever time the film was being made. Miss Reissa promised to do all she could to have the work done in time. The Players interested saw Miss Reissa and agreed to the terms that had been arranged.

Mossempires  
and English Taxis. Mr. Hunt reported that he had written to Mossempires for full particulars as to percentages, Theatres and the type of plays they would support for an English and Scottish tour. He also reported that he intended when in London and if time permitted, to visit the Mossempires Offices & also Messrs Reward & Wyndham and to obtain information re tours for consideration by the

Board.

Teat Plays Mr Hunt submitted a scheme for the production of two Teat plays in Peacock Theatre in the Peacock Theatre. The plays suggested were the verse version of "The Blue Glass" and "The Countess Catchpole".

The Board decided that consideration of the scheme be postponed until the next meeting when Mr Hunt would be present.

Mr George Hall. Mr Hunt reported that as requested by the Board, he had written to Mr George Hall suggesting that he might withdraw his play "The Phoenix & the Cockatoos". Mr Hall's letter agreeing to do so was read to the Board.

Mrs Sara Payne. Mr Hunt reported that Mrs Sara Payne was prepared to take one class per week in Rhythical movement at a fee of one guinea per lesson without a pianist and 25/- per lesson with one.

Mr Hunt also stated that he had asked Miss Devlin and one juvenile man from the University to compete for the School of Acting Scholarship. Miss Devlin had promised to do so but no reply had been received from the man.

The cast of "The Passing Day" by George Shiels was submitted.

The Board decided to consider it at the next meeting.

Letter from Denis O'Dea A letter was read from Mr Denis O'Dea stating that he was leaving New York for Dublin on 16th March.

Letter from Arthur Cox re Whales. A letter was read from Mr Arthur Cox stating that it would be some days before Messrs Whales would give their final instructions to their solicitors regarding the price they would be willing to accept for their premises.

Mr. Cox re Licence. A letter was read from Mr Arthur Cox stating that the Letters Patent of the Theatre contain a clause (No. 13) prohibiting the sale in the Theatre or in any part of the Theatre Premises of wines, spirits, beer, or any intoxicating or Spirituous liquor, and that he was asking the Attorney General if the Freeholder Council would be willing to delete this clause. Mr Cox was of opinion he would refuse to do so without a formal hearing.

Mr. Cox re Articles of Association. A letter was read from Mr Arthur Cox stating he would prepare draft alterations in the Articles of Association and submit them for consideration by the Board.

Bill for 23rd March. It was decided that "Bridgehead" should run for the week commencing 23rd March instead of "On The Rocks" as originally arranged. Mr Hunt explained that some of the original

Cast were not now available and that he found the people whom he wanted were playing at the Gate. Also the cast was very big and expensive and he doubted if the play could be done without a heavy loss.

Mr. Wilson Dr. Hayes raised the question of Mr. Lennox Wilson and Gate Theatre acting as Producers at the Gate Theatre.

Mr. Higgins said Mr. Wilson had informed him that he was only producing one play, but Mr. Higgins considered it was wrong in principle for Mr. Wilson to be working at the Gate.

Senator Blythe was of opinion that if it were only for one week no question would arise but if Mr. Wilson intended to produce at the Gate for any period, Sen. Blythe was of opinion that Mr. Wilson should absent himself from the Abbey Theatre Board meetings.

Mrs. Rooney Mr. Higgins then referred to Mrs. Rita Rooney's desire to leave of absence to be allowed to go to London to play in Lord Longford's play "Hamlet of Jade" which was to be produced for two weeks at the Westminster Theatre. In connection with this Mr. Hunt said Mrs. Rooney had asked him if the public performance by the students of the School of Acting could be postponed until her return from London. Mr. Higgins said he considered that this accommodation of players was going to far and after some discussion it was decided that the Board would not put any obstacle in Mrs. Rooney's way.

Production by

It was further decided while she was away the

pupils of the School should themselves put on in the Peacock Theatre "Cradle Song" for three nights and "Rising of the Moon" + "Land of Heat's Desire" for three nights. It was also decided that when the School is reorganized under Mr. Hunt's Scheme Mrs. Mooney should be paid £3 per week instead of £2 as at present. Mr. Thomas was against this decision.

Mr. Hunt reported he had seen the RKO outfit in London and that the Corporation would agree to £150 as the figure for the Abbey Theatre and that the salaries to the players would be Mr. McCormick and Miss Cowe - jointly 900 Abs. Mr. Barry 750 Abs. Mr. Arthur Shields 500 Abs.

It was decided that Mr. Hunt should make another effort to obtain £200 if possible for the Theatre.

Mrs Empires  
Tour.

Mr. Hunt reported he had seen Ms. Plingsby of the Mrs. Empires Tour who had appeared a tour - Glasgow 3 weeks, Edinburgh 1 week, Liverpool 1 week, Leeds 1 week and perhaps Birmingham 1 week. Mr. Hunt was awaiting further information as to capacity of the theatres, percentages etc.

Yeats plays  
in Peacock.

Mr. Hunt reported that some of the players he approached with a view to producing Yeats plays in the Peacock considered the salaries offered were too low. There was also the difficulty that as some were playing in the State they <sup>it</sup> would not be available. It was decided that the project be dropped for the present.

A letter from the Century Insurance Co was read asking if the Theatre would be prepared to pay Mr T. ability of the auditorium and the lack of proper ventilation.

Letter from  
Dr W. B. Yeats

A letter was read from Dr Yeats saying he had had complaints from several quarters of Mr Cusack's performance in "The Playboy" and if one or two others thecheap in the representation of the play. He did not know if these complaints were justified as he had not seen the play. He said that should any discussion be likely to come before the Board upon the nature of the tradition of acting founded under the influence of Synge, Lady Gregory and himself, he would be very anxious to

be present.

In the discussion which followed Mr Higgins stated that he wished to criticise Mr Cusack's acting but his speech, his exaggeration of accent. Mr Higgins considered that Mr Cusack wanted his lines, and that in the production there was a clash of two methods as far as the actors were concerned, the old players playing in the old traditional method the new players not doing so.

Mr O'Connor disagreed with Mr Higgins as also did Mr Hyde who considered all the old players bad and the young ones good.

It was eventually decided by a majority of the Board that Mr. feet be informed that the Directors saw no reason for discussing the matter, Mr Higgins strongly dissenting from this view.

Mr Higgins then proposed that the play be not revived ~~but~~ on the date for which it was next arranged. There was a second and the proposal fell through.

The following resolution was then proposed by Mr Higgins.

Proposed that all future productions of early Abbey plays, especially the plays of Lady Gregory, J.M. Synge, and W.B. Yeats be produced strictly in keeping with the Abbey tradition of acting - a tradition deliberately created and nurtured by the founders of the Theatre, through the magnificence of rhythm, dialect and natural gesture; that the future casts of such plays be composed only of players trained in that tradition; and further, that picked students in the Abbey School of Acting be given constant tuition in that method of naturalistic acting with its reverent attention to the cadence and rich tang of Anglo-Irish speech.

This motion was withdrawn as there was a second.

The following report was presented to the Board by the Finance Sub-Committee who had been asked on 31st July to explore the possibility of effecting economies in the running of the Theatre.

Finance Sub Committee Report.

The Sub Committee appointed by the Board Meeting of July 31st 1936 to examine ways and means of effecting economies in the Theatre's expenditure, submits the following unanimous recommendations for reductions in the staff of the Theatre.

Back Pit: One Pit Attendant or the Cafe Attendant to go and that the work in that part of the House to be re-arranged to cope with the shortage. Saving of wage £1.0.9 or £1.4.6d per week.

Stalls Box Office: To dispense with the services of Mrs. Harty and that Miss Ryan take her place from 7.30 to 8.30. Saving £1.9.2d weekly.

Stalls & Balcony: Six persons are presently employed in these parts of the House. Proposed to dispense with two employees - i.e., Mr. Manweiler and Miss Broul. The work of the Cloak Room should be controlled by the Cafe attendant so as to release Sloane for Ticket collecting. Saving £1.7.6d and £1.0.9d weekly.

Orchestra: Two players to go. Saving £6.0.0 weekly.

Ward Robe: Miss Devoy to go on grounds of inefficiency.

Back Stage Staff: Proposed to dispense with the services of Barney Murphy (Prompter) @ 12/6d weekly; Jim Murphy (Night Staff) £1.3.6d weekly, Ned Byrne (Night staff) £1.3.6d weekly and Frank Ellis (Peacock sweeper) £1.5.0 weekly. Saving £4.4.0 weekly.

Players: It is suggested that Miss May Craigs contract be not renewed and that reduction of 10% in the salaries of all players be made; producing a saving of £300. approx annually.

These proposed economies will produce an annual saving of £1,100 approx. It is suggested that Mr. Higgins interview Mr. Robbins of the I.T.W.U. (Theatre Section) regarding the necessity of these Staff reductions and if necessary that the official be shown the balance sheet, so that he may be convinced of the necessities.

It is proposed that the Drop Curtain be allotted for advertising matter and  
that the local Advertising Agents be invited to quote the best prices for the  
annual rental of the Curtain. It is also suggested that Programmes should be  
sold at 2d per copy in all parts of the House.

APPOINTMENT OF AUDITOR

I am in receipt of your letter of the 5th November.

Under your Articles of Association the appointment of Auditors is to be governed by Sections 112 and 133 of the Companies Acts of 1908

Sec. 112 prescribed that a person, other than the retiring Auditor shall not be appointed Auditor at an Annual General Meeting, unless notice of an intention to nominate that person has been given by a shareholder to the Company not less than 14 days before the annual general meeting, and the Company must send a copy of such notice to the retiring Auditor, and give notice thereof to the shareholders, either by notice or by advertisement, not less than 7 days before the Annual General Meeting.

These formalities were not carried out, and therefore the appointment of Mr. O'Connor was not correctly made. I am afraid therefore that the present position is a rather difficult one. The Auditor should have been appointed at the annual general meeting, but the appointment which was made was invalid, and therefore, no Auditor has been validly appointed.

Sub- sec (2) of 112 of the Act, provides that if an appointment

of Auditors is not made at an annual general meeting, the Department of Industry & Commerce may, on the application of any member of the Company, appoint an Auditor of the Company for the current year, and fix the remuneration to be paid to him by the Company for his services.

The simplest way of dealing with the matter might be that we should get into touch with the Secretary of the Department of Industry & Commerce, and arrange for the Department to make the appointment. Having regard to the fact that the difficulty has arisen only through a mistake in procedure, and that there was a substantial majority who voted in favor of Mr. O'Connor, I would imagine that the Department would then appoint Mr. O'Connor, but it would be open to them to appoint somebody else if they so desired.

If you agree with this course, and instruct me, I shall write to the Department, but it would assist me in doing so if you would be good enough to let me have a copy of the Notice convening the Annual General meeting, as this will have to be submitted to the Department when we are writing to them.

It was also agreed that Miss Mooney be paid £3-7-6 per week up to the end of Christmas week but the Board decided that this action in this matter was not to be regarded as a precedent.

Players' Contracts. The question of contracts was discussed and as only one Player had stated his objections to the contracts issued for signature it was decided on the suggestion of Mr Higgins that two of the Directors should interview the Players concerned and have a friendly discussion of the matter. Mr Higgins and Mr Mylne were appointed to meet the Players.

Players' Contracts

Mr Higgins reported on an interview he had had with Jim Moore, Tom Delany, Mr Shields, Mr McCormick and Mr Dolan regarding the new contracts which had been given to these Players for signature but which they had refused to sign. Mr O'Byrne who was to have been with Mr Higgins at this interview was prevented by illness from attending. The Players above mentioned and Mr Higgins had met and had discussed in detail the clauses of the contract.

Many of the amendments suggested by the Players, Mr Higgins considered quite fair and reasonable and he put them before the Board with a recommendation that they be accepted.

No Higgins further reported that at the conclusion of the discussion all the players with the exception of Miss Delaney refused to sign the amended contract but Mrs Cowell, Messrs McCormick and Dolan to give Mr Higgins a final reply on Friday 11th Decr 1916. Mr Higgins stated he had these replies; Miss Cowell and Mr McCormick being willing to sign if some definite arrangement were made regarding afternoon rehearsals; Mr Dolan asked for higher salary and Mr Arthur Shields wrote stating that as he hoped at sometime to have an opportunity of returning to Hollywood to work under John Ford he would prefer not to tie himself to the Theatre at the moment. The Board considered the amendments recommended by Mr Higgins in the various clauses of the Contract and having revised the Contract directed that copies of this revised version be offered to Miss Cowell & Mr McCormick. It was also decided that an attempt should be made to bring Mr Dolan to a reasonable point of view.

As Mr Shields would not accept a contract it was decided that in future he be paid £6-15-0 as Assistant Producer and £1-10-0 as an actor. Mr Shields was informed of this when he came before the Board.

Plans for reconstructing the Theatre. The Secretary reported on an interview he had had with Mr M. Scott, Architect, re the drawing up of a scheme of reconstruction of the Theatre which it might be possible to carry through in stages spread over a number of years. Mr Scott in the first instance required as a basis, the information as to the seating capacity of the proposed theatre and suggested 600 seats. The Board decided that Mr Scott should as quickly as possible draw up the

main parts of a scheme on this basis.

A letter was read from Mrs Ma Noyne thanking the Directors for paying her half salary up to Decr. 26th.

Mr J. P. O'Connor

A letter was read from Mr J. P. O'Connor thanking the Board for the fee of £2-2-0 sent him in connection with his trip to Cork.

Mr Cyril Cusack.

A letter was read from Mr Cyril Cusack stating he was severing his connections with the Theatre as he had been granted permission to go to Manchester to play for a week where it was known he would not be required in the other.

Mr Hart reported on this matter and stated he had tried to reason with Mr Cusack and discuss the matter with him but that he had not been successful.

Bir Little Theatre.

A letter was read from the Secretary, Little Theatre, Birr asking if the Board would release Mrs Ma Noyne for the period 21st March 1937 to possibly 10th April 1937 to play in a new play by David Sean.

The board decided that as Mrs O'Farrell was in charge of the School of Acting as well as acting in the Theatre, she could not be released for that period.

Mr Hart

Mr Hart reported that business in Cork had been very poor and suggested that the Board might at another time consider doing a fortnight there instead of a week if they could find plays which would appeal to the Cork audience.

He also stated he found the scale of tipping for the local Steffens high & that in cooperation with the local Manager he had reduced it. The Board decided that this scale should apply in future.

Finance.

Mr. Blythe reported on the interviews which he had conducted with Dr. Hayes and Mr. Higgins had had with the Minister of Finance who received them very cordially. The Minister was informed of the financial position of the Theatre and of the structural alterations which were being put in hand as an immediate necessity in order to comply with the demands of the Corporation authorities. He depudation informed the Minister that the Board did not seek any additional subsidy for the actual running of the Theatre but asked him to help financially some work of reconstruction which would be of a permanent nature and would fall in with a scheme for a future improvement of the entire premises. He also suggested to the Minister that it might be possible for the Board of Works to purchase Whynes' premises with a view to the Theatre obtaining patron or all of them if needed at a late date.

The Minister is replying enquired if the Board would not go further and give for the reconstruction of a proper theatre with a theatre or hall which could be used by the Gaelic Players. He also suggested a building which would also have a theatre which would be a home for international drama as distinct from the type of work done in the Abbey.

Mr. Blythe said his impression of the interview was that the Minister was speaking very personally and that the Minister's views might not find favour with the members of the Executive Council.

The Board decided that a written appeal be sent to the Minister stating the immediate needs of the theatre and pointing out the necessity for a better National Theatre. Dr Hayes, Mr Blaythe and Mr Higgins were deputed to draw up this letter.

Mr W.B. Yeats

The Chairman said he was anxious to develop an old art, the speaking of poetry to a musical accompaniment. He wished to have certain poems spoken and sung from the Abbey stage. It being he proposed two resolutions as follows:-

No I. Proposed by Mr F.H. Higgins and seconded by Dr Starkie "That Mr Yeats arrange for the singing and speaking of certain poems from the Abbey stage, the performance to last about fifteen minutes; the poems to be chosen by Mr Yeats and his authority to be that of a producer. That Mr Yeats may arrange two programmes." This resolution was passed.

No II. Proposed by Dr E. Blaythe and seconded by Dr Starkie: "That Mr Yeats be empowered to arrange if possible for the broadcasting of the performances." This resolution was also passed. It was proposed by Mr F.H. Higgins, seconded by Dr Starkie and passed "That Mr Yeats be empowered to arrange for a programme to be broadcast by the B.B.C."

It was decided that one programme should run with "the week's" which would be the bill for either the week commencing Feb 1st or Feb 8th, the poems to be by W.B. Yeats, F.H. Higgins and James Stephens and it was agreed that a minimum fee of three guineas be paid to James Stephens as royalty.

Mr Higgins reported that he had taken a test of Mr Jno.

Stephenson broadcasting some of the songs in the Studio of the Broadcasting Station and that the results had been exceedingly successful. Dr. O'Brien had already heard the tests and was very pleased with Mr. Stephenson's work.

Date of Board Meetings

It was decided that for the carrying on of the business of the Theatre, Wednesday would be a more suitable day than Friday for holding Board meetings, and Wednesday was accordingly fixed on the motion of Mr. Blythe seconded by Dr. Starkie.

Rent of Lodging

The Board agreed to let the Peacock to Mr. Hodwick for a fortnight at the end of April at the usual charge of £8 per week.

Signing of Contracts by Players.

Mr Arthur Shields did not wish to sign any contract owing to the possibility of his going to Hollywood in the near future but he promised to return to Butlin with the Company from Cambridge and to give the fullest possible notice as to when he would be leaving the Theatre for America.

Mr Higgins then read a letter he had just received from Mr Dolan in which he stated that his financial position was at the moment very bad, that he was badly in debt through no fault of his own and that he did not know what his position would be by the time the Company was due to leave for Cambridge.

After some discussion the Board authorised Mr Higgins to interview Mr Dolan and obtain from him a detailed account of his financial difficulties, Mr Higgins to report on the matter at the next Board Meeting.

Mr Higgins also reported that the Players were unanimous in complaining of the manner in which they were treated by Mr Hart. They also complained that at their previous meeting with Mr Higgins Mr Hart had been present and that the Players had no opportunity of putting their complaints before the Directors or pleading their case. COPY LETTER RECEIVED FROM WARREN P. MUNSELL, BUSINESS MANAGER, THE THEATRE GUILD, INC. 245 WEST 52nd STREET, NEW YORK CITY. dated March 23, 1937.

Dear Mr Gorman,

Since our correspondence of last fall a proposition has come up which might make possible an Abbey Theatre tour in the United States and Canada under the Theatre Guild management. We have purchased a play by Edward J. Eustace called THE KING OF THE MOUNTAINS. The locale is in the coal fields of Pennsylvania in 1876 and the principal characters are the Irish who formed the Mollie Maguire Society and lived in that section at the time. The general scheme of the play depicts the early struggle between the first coal barons and the miners.

As the play stands we are not quite satisfied with it and have arranged with Mr. Sidney Howard, one of our foremost dramatists, to revise the play. He expects to do this work next summer or in the early fall so that the play will be available sometime during next season. If you are interested in the proposition which follows, it probably will be more convenient for us to have the plays produced in the spring of 1938 than any other time. This is the proposition we wish to make:

1. The Abbey Theatre Company will produce the play in Dublin with their own actors and personnel. This production will be announced as having been made in association with the Theatre Guild and the general scheme of the production is to be subject to our approval and the physical production is to be built so that it can be shipped to the United States and handled in American theatres. To facilitate our cooperation doubtless one or more of our directors will arrange to be in Dublin the last few weeks of rehearsal. The physical production can be approved by arranging for blue prints to be sent to us in advance.

2. The Theatre Guild is to have an option to bring the entire company and production to the United States and Canada on terms to be agreed upon in advance for the individual actors and the Abbey Theatre. The option is to be exercised within one week of the time the play opens in the Abbey Theatre. We should like the right to replace members of the company if in our opinion we do not consider them suitable for an American audience, but we would not of course change the general character of the performance. The American tour is to be presented by us and to be billed the Theatre Guild presents the Abbey Players, etc.

3. The financial responsibility for the American tour, if undertaken by us, shall be entirely ours. The Dublin engagement shall be your financial responsibility, except that in consideration for your preparing the play for our eventual use we will pay for half the cost of making the production in Dublin and if we exercise our option to bring the play to America, we will pay the other half of the production cost. In that case the production will then be our property, though I rather imagine that after the tour is finished we would give you back the production without cost in case it is of any value to you in Ireland. In this connection, we consider the cost of

production aside including fees to directors, scenic designers and all others in connection with the presentation of the play. Naturally we would expect you to use your best efforts to keep these fees as small as possible and in no event larger than you customarily pay for such services.

If your directors are in sympathy with this general scheme and would like to be associated with us somewhat along the lines outlined above in a production of THE KING OF THE MOUNTAINS, will you please advise me as soon as possible. I will then send you a manuscript of the play in its present form and you can then make up a tentative budget to send us on the cost of the production. We realize, of course, that this schedule will have to be quite flexible since in his revisions Mr. Howard will probably radically rewrite the play. I imagine the last act will be eliminated and that probably it will not be necessary to use as many people as are indicated in the dance hall scene. Your budget, therefore, would not be final until we send you Mr. Howard's version nor for that matter would your commitment be final until then because we do not propose to have the play produced in its present form and of course if Mr. Howard's version should not interest us, we might decide not to produce it. The purpose of this letter is merely to find out whether or not you are interested in the general scheme. At the time you reply, you might indicate what compensation the Abbey Theatre would expect for itself on account of the American tour.

If the play is produced in the spring of 1938, we probably would not want to present it in the United States until the fall of 1938 and would of course want the option to keep the company in the United States for the entire season if the play should prove successful. We would guarantee that it would play in the United States not less than five weeks.

During the next few months some of our directors will undoubtedly be in England and provided you are interested in our proposition iron out any details which we are not able to settle by letter.

Mr Lennox Robinson questioned Mr Higgins title of 'Manager of Tour' as stated on the notice convening meeting. Mr Higgins explained his position, supported by Mr Shields. Mr L. Robinson's opinion, that the position existed only during the holidays, was rectified on the understanding that the position continued during the period preparatory to the Company leaving for America.

Mr Blythe questioned the possible details in a likely contract from Mr Lee Hubert, particularly in relation to the date of tour, plays to produce on the tour, transportation of scenery & the provision of profits and especially regarding royalties. A discussion ensued, from which it was decided that the delegation to London should negotiate on the question of royalties & that the National Theatre Society should

not be responsible for the payment of unlimited royalties; 10% on 4000 dollars was considered the maximum. Mr Higgins suggested the company's responsibility for 5% on 5000 dollars only; this suggestion was considered unacceptable to Shubert.

Mr Starkie, thought best a typed list of questions on such matters should be presented to Shubert by the deputation.

It was finally felt that the deputation must depend on <sup>its</sup> own judgment on such details & if necessary to set up telephone communication with the Directors in Dublin should any crisis arise.

Members of Dr R. Hayes proposed that Mr J. R. Higgins and Deputation Mr A. Shields go to London for the interview on behalf of the Board. Mr F.R. Higgins gave the meeting a detailed report of the interview which Mr Shields himself had with Mr Lee Shubert in London on the previous Saturday in the course of which Mr Lee Shubert expressed complete ignorance of any proposed deal with Mr Lubling on behalf of the Abbey Theatre. In the course of the discussion with Mr Higgins, Mr Lee Shubert proposed to offer the Abbey Theatre a contract for a ten weeks tour in the USA & Canada at 50% gross receipts, with a guaranteed minimum of 3000 dollars per week. Mr Higgins communicated this offer by telephone to Mr Blythe in Dublin & later received a telegram from Mr Blythe stating that Hayes, Johnson himself were agreeable to the offer. In a subsequent interview with Mr Shubert Mr Higgins provisionally accepted the offer on behalf of the Board & asked for a written contract to be sent to Dublin at an early date.

On the following Wednesday the contract was received by Mr Higgins but as the financial terms were not in agreement with those offered A

by Mr Shubert, Mr Higgins word the corrections and afterwards on the telephone by telegram these corrections were confirmed. On the basis of the letters, wires & phone talks between Mr Shubert & Mr J R Higgins, the Board asked Mr Higgins to send the following contract to Mr Shubert for signature.

We represent and warrant that we hold these rights free and clear, and that we have made no default in the observance of any of the terms and conditions in the contracts with the Authors, under which we have obtained and enjoy these rights, and have made payments of all royalties as in the contracts provided.

We further represent and warrant that all of the FOURTEEN important artists who have been performing in the said plays and in the respective important parts thereof, will be the fourteen artists whom we will bring to the United States of America and will, subject to illness, appear and perform in the said plays in the intended visit to the United States of America and Canada.

The following is the list of the plays, with the names of the Authors; and from this list the Repertoire for the United States of America and Canada will be selected:-

and if necessary other plays from the Company's Repertoire to be chosen

by mutual agreement.

The Company we shall send to America shall include, except in cases of illness, the following players:- O'Dea, McCormick, Delany, Crows, Craig, Dolan, Shields, O'Connor and Carolan.

We undertake to pay the salaries of our players, Stage Manager and Company Manager; and all Royalties due to the Authors of plays produced by us during the tour.

It is understood that the Tour will begin in the United States of America sometime during the month of October, 1937, and shall play in such Cities as you shall determine. The tour shall be no longer and no less than TEN WEEKS unless by mutual consent.

You agree to pay transportation and cabin fares from Dublin to port of arrival in the United States of America; and to pay all railroad transportation of Company and effects from City to City during the tour in America and at the conclusion of the tour to pay transportation and cabin fares from the City in which the Company finishes this tour to Dublin, Ireland. This arrangement is for not more than sixteen persons and for such stage scenery and properties as are necessary for the production of any or all of the foregoing mentioned plays.

We are to have the option to cancel and terminate the engagement at the end of six weeks, provided the same shall show returns to us of less than 4000 dollars per week.

Of course, we are to bring over the productions intact and deliver same to you in the United States of America at such port as you shall designate, and we shall obtain all rights of entry as well as assurances that might be required by the United States Government.

If this will confirm your understanding of our talks, then with your signature at the bottom hereof, under the word "ACCEPTED", this will become a contract between us.

Legal opinion Mr Blythe suggested that Mr Higgins should ask Mr Arthur Cox, solicitor, to read over the Contract and if necessary to make whatever alterations as may be required to safeguard the Theatres interests. This suggestion was accepted.

Signature to Contract It was agreed on Mr Blythes proposal that Mr J R Higgins be authorised to sign the contract on behalf of the National Theatre Socy, Ltd. & that Mr Hubert be informed to that effect. Mr Higgins was also authorised by the Board to conduct whatever business was necessary by phone or wire with Mr Hubert arising out of the Contract for signature.

Management of Bus While discussing the number of persons necessary to go on the tour, for inclusion in the Contract, Mr Arthur Shields explained that under the present gross receipt sharing basis it was very necessary that some person, and as a Director, should accompany the Players to America for the dealing with all financial matters,

spend together with general management, lecturing, interviewing etc as required for the theatre. This work Mr Shelds stated could not be undertaken by a player. Mr Blythe agreed with the necessity of such a person.

Dr Richard Hayes enquired if Mr Huggins could travel to America & undertake such work for the tour. In reply Mr Huggins expressed his willingness to go & to undertake the work. In reply to a question by Mr A. Shelds Mr Blythe suggested that the Director accompanying the players should be styled the Company Manager.

Dr Hayes expressed an opinion that another person such as Mr Robinson might go to America, as assistant to Mr Huggins. Mr Huggins was not favourable to the suggestion and after a discussion it was decided to leave over the matter until a fuller meeting of the Board took place. In the meanwhile Mr Huggins was to inform Mr Shelds that 14 players & two other persons would travel.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the Ministry of Finance offering to pay 80% of the cost of alterations & not more than £2800. Mr Huggins was asked to acknowledge the letter.

Mr Higgins explained to the meeting that having drafted the contract on the basis of the terms negotiated, he submitted the draft to Mr Arthur Cox, Sol.; and having had the Contract approved, Mr Higgins submitted it to Mr Lee Shubert for signature. Mr Higgins spoke to Mr Lee Shubert on the phone as suggested; and with the contract before him Mr Shubert mentioned certain details as follows (1) That the Abbeys option to cancel the tour after six weeks ~~and~~ should equally apply to the Shubert Corporation. Higgins deleted that clause from the contract. (2) That the Abbey Theatre be responsible for the payment of Equity dues. (3) That the 3000 dollars weekly be paid weekly and additional weekly amounts be paid at the end of the season. (4) That we try to arrange the tour earlier than Oct 1<sup>st</sup> if so desired by Shubert, they giving us notice to that effect no later than August 15<sup>th</sup>. Mr Higgins explained to the Board his reasons for accepting these details - his acceptance was approved by the Board. He signed contract with these foregoing

amendments incorporated was duly received by Mr Higgins on June 28<sup>th</sup> 1937.

Mr Higgins read copies of the various replies he had called to Lebling, & Madden who asked for interests in an American tour; he also gave details of his cable to Lebling giving particulars of the Agreement & stating that Shubert repudiated Lebling's supposed deal. A letter was read from Mr Percy Burton of London claiming to represent Shubert & asking for matters suitable for an extensive publicity campaign in connection with the tour. Mr Higgins read the letter he had sent in reply assuming that Mr Burton was acting under the direct instructions of Mr Shubert. No reply was received to that letter. The Board felt that caution should be shown towards such vague approaches.

Management  
of the tour

Arising out of the minutes, Dr Hayes suggested the possibility of Mr Lennox Robinson travelling to America in some capacity in connection with the tour. Dr Starkie supported the suggestion, particularly as the Shubert corporation was to pay certain travelling expenses over and above those of players. A lengthy discussion followed the suggestion, & as a result it was felt that Mr Higgins' position & duties in America should be clearly defined, for the purpose of avoiding any confusion in the event of Mr Robinson travelling with the company.

Dr W. Starkie submitted a notice of motion on the matter for discussion & decision at the next meeting.

After some discussion a resolution on the terms of the motion was proposed by Mr. Frank O'Connor, seconded by Dr. Hayes and passed, the Board deciding to pay Mr. Robinson a nominal salary of £1 per week for his services as Assistant Producer.

It was agreed that Mr. Higgins be paid one hundred and seventy five dollars (175 dollars) ~~as his charge~~ per week while in charge of the tour in America.

The following Players were selected for the tour: Arthur Shields, T. J. McCormick, M. J. Dolan, P. J. Carolan, Sean O'Casey, W. Bright, F. Johnston, W. O'Gorman, Eileen Gowen, Nancie Delaney, Fay Tracy

Nia Rooney, Aileen O'Connor, Lolie Julian (or Nora O'Halloran).

The Board authorised Mr Higgins to leave Contracts signed by these Players.

The Board agreed at the end of the tour to divide one third of the net profits of the tour above £2500 between the Players in proportion to their salaries, and it was decided that this clause be in the Players' Contracts.

The Board decided that in Mr Corcoran's contract it should be set out that he would receive 85 dollars as an actor and 50 dollars as stage manager. As that in the event of his proving unsatisfactory as stage manager, he could be removed from the position and his salary reduced accordingly.

Mr Higgins reported that some new sets of scenery would be required for the tour and the Board agreed that they should be made.

The Board decided that copies of the Theatre Guild Contract for the production of "The Thing of the Mountains" should be sent to all the Directors to enable them to consider it before reaching a decision as to its acceptance.

Mrs O'Connor suggested that in view of the future need of an Irish scene designer Miss Ann Yeats might be sent Paris for six months to enable her to learn stage design. It was decided that the matter be put to Mr W.B. Yeats on his return to Dublin.

It was decided that contracts be given to four women and four men in the group of Players who would be playing in the Abbey during the American tour.

No Higgins said that as far as he best had desired all knowledge of Liebling he (No Higgins) did not consider that Liebling was entitled to the usual Agent's fee of 10%.

After some discussion the Board decided that Mr Higgins should write to Liebling putting the facts before him and suggesting a fee of 5% as his commission in the transaction.

M. It was agreed that Mr. Higgins and Mr. O'Connor should draft a programme for the School.
